Steps for the application process:

- 2. Pick up, read, and complete the application packet. (Application packets are available in the guidance office)
- 3. Request a copy of your transcripts to attach to the application.
- 4. Turn completed packet into your guidance counselor by the appropriate deadline, along with the \$30 non-refundable test fee (Make all checks payable to Green High School).
- 5. Be prepared to attend a meeting to discuss your proposal or to re-submit it as necessary.
- 6. Once the test-out option is approved, a test date will be set.
- 7. Submit your application by the determined deadlines: **June 30**th (if applying for first semester) or **October 31**st (if applying for second semester).

Major Literary Work: The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet by William Shakespeare

Accompanying Literary Analysis Assignment: If you could blame one character for the demise of both Romeo and Juliet, whom would you choose? In a persuasive essay, explain your stance using specific references-quotes and actions from the play.

Research project: Student will research the Renaissance and choose an area of interest - literature, art music, science - and write an informative research paper (3-5 pages, MLA format) explaining its influence on today's culture.

Major Literary Work: To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

Accompanying Literary Analysis Assignment: Compose a personal reflective essay in which you compare a personal "coming of age" story to the experience of Scout as described in the novel. How are your experiences similar to Scout's? How are they different? How is this meaningful? Make specific references to the literary text in your essay.

Research project: Student must research a career field in which he/she is interested and write a 3-5 page research paper on that career using MLA format. Student must use three reliable sources.

Major Literary Work: The Scarlet Letter by Nathaniel Hawthorne

Accompanying Literary Analysis Assignment: Compose a 3-page typed essay that addresses the following prompt:

Authors often create characters who refuse to compromise their principles. These characters may be heroic, tragic, or misguided. Choose a character from *The Scarlet Letter* who declines to compromise a deeply-held belief. Identify the character, the principle in which the character believes, and show – using specific references – the action the character took to uphold this principle and the outcome of that action. Finally, evaluate the character's decision to show if it is heroic, tragic, or misguided.

Research project: Student will select a social issue addressed in the novel that still has relevance for contemporary audiences. In a 4-page document, student will describe the issue in the context of the novel, compare it to the issue in the contemporary context, and come to a conclusion regarding the timelessness of this great literary work.

Upon achievement of qualifying score on examination described above, the student must read the major literary work named below, compose the accompanying literary analysis, and complete a research project. Detailed explanations of the requirements for these assignments will be made available to the student when he/she is prepared to begin this work.

Major Literary Work: Brave New World by Aldus Huxley

Accompanying Literary Analysis Assignment: Compose a 3-4 page typed essay, write a letter to Mustapha Mond in which you argue that the price that he and his society have paid for stability is not worth the cost. Describe, using specific references from the text, what has been sacrificed in the name of stability and why, according to your own experience and that of a character on the novel, the ends to not justify the means.

Research project: Write a 5-page argumentative research paper in which you demonstrate the extent to which Huxley's 1932 work was predictive of things to come. The paper must have a clear thesis statement supported by evidence drawn both from the novel and credible contemporary resources. The document must be written in MLA format, feature correctly integrated direct quotations, a Works Cited page, and a minimum of six valid sources, one of which cannot be from the Internet.
